**School district could add 2 charter schools**

**One is an alternative high school, the other is K-8**

Leon County could be looking at the addition of two charter schools opening as early as next summer.

Following the recommendation of Leon County Superintendent Jackie Pons, the School Board voted unanimously Tuesday night to approve two new charter school applications, although School Board member Forrest Van Camp had some misgivings. DeeDee Rasmussen was absent from the meeting.

"I have to tell you, I have reservations about opening up new charter schools," Van Camp said. He expressed his trepidations in moving forward with the approval process, with concerns that included the success of the schools, transportation and the elimination of an "us-versus-them" mentality in charter-district relationships. Both schools would be operated by outside management companies.

"I really need to feel good that we are going to have a good partnership," he said. The New Alternative Education High School of Leon County, Inc., application presented a school that would be centered on helping at-risk students focus on graduation and technical careers.

The Renaissance Charter School at Leon, a school that will extend from kindergarten to eighth grade, has an application that proposes high student achievement and a concentration on academic rigor and student engagement.

Charter schools are public schools that have their own board and contract, or charter, to operate in a school district. Once established, charter schools are evaluated

annually and must apply for renewal of their charter at the end of their contract, which is generally five years in Leon County. There are four charter schools in Leon County.

The New Alternative Education High School, which would be managed by the South Florida-based Mavericks in Education, intends to use the school previously occupied by the failed charter school Life Skills, which closed over the summer. The application anticipates up to 350 students the first year and plans to grow up to 400 students by 2017.

Renaissance, to be managed by Charter Schools USA, intends to build a new school and anticipates up to 1,400 elementary and middle school students by the school's fifth year.

Van Camp expressed concerns about what sort of impact a school of 1,400 students could have on local schools.

"Three years from now, are we going to face the closing of one of our existing schools?" he asked.

"Really, being responsible for the 33,000 kids that are enrolled in our public schools, I need to know if opening a new charter school with 1,400 kids is going to impact, and what impact it is going to have on our current public schools," he added.

While Life Skills cast a cloud of doubt over the remedial high school's future success, school board member Dee Crumpler said a new school meant a new game.

"There is no reason that this charter school cannot be a good neighbor, a community member and a leader," he said. "This superintendent and this school board are all about finding ways to provide second chances to kids who have fallen through the cracks."

The county will begin negotiating a charter contract with the governing board of both charter schools based on a series of guidelines set forth by the district. The final charter contract will go before the board for a vote on Jan. 24 of next year.

#### **Stokes, new FSU provost, hits the ground running**

Garnett Stokes has been at her new job almost two full months, yet she's still having trouble finding time to completely unpack.

Florida State's new provost, the second-in-command at the university, has maintained a hectic pace since she arrived in Tallahassee at the start of August.

Even before she joined FSU President Eric Barron, Stokes found herself appointed to a statewide task force examining a proposal before the Board of Governors, the body that oversees Florida's public universities.

This has been a typically busy week for Stokes. On Monday, she spent much of the day at FSU's College of Education. Tuesday she was at FSU's Panama City campus for the first time, meeting key faculty and staff.

"Nothing is more important than getting to know the people at your institution," Stokes said. "I'm still meeting department chairs and other faculty. Frankly, I'm not sure when I'll ever get around to unpacking."

Stokes, 55, is being asked to fill some mighty big shoes. Her predecessor, Larry Abele, who stepped down in December, had been provost for 16 years under three presidents.

Stokes, an industrial and organizational psychologist who moved up the ladder at University of Georgia to dean of its college of arts and sciences, is acutely aware of the comparisons being made as she makes her way around FSU's campus.

"Any time you follow a well established leader you have big shoes to follow. I heard the same thing as a dean," she said. "It just comes with the territory when you walk into a position where the leader has been very well respected and established.

"You learn from the successes and the mistakes of your predecessors and create your own path."

### **'Celebrate Freedom' curriculum includes photos from Tallahassee**

Leon County students have special reason to "celebrate freedom" this week. That's because a new supplemental curriculum for Florida social studies classes contains photographs that help document the important role that Tallahassee once played in our nation's civil rights struggle.

The photos are part of a 12-page Newspapers-in-Education (NIE) curriculum called "Celebrate Freedom," which is being distributed this week to more than 130,000 students around the state. The curriculum is sponsored by The James Madison Institute (JMI), in association with NIE departments at a dozen Florida newspapers (including the Tallahassee Democrat).

"Celebrate Freedom" is designed especially for classroom use during Celebrate Freedom Week, the last full week of instruction in September. During this special week, Florida social studies teachers are expected to devote three hours of classroom instruction to the Declaration of Independence, and Florida students are expected to recite the key passage which begins, "We hold these truths to be self evident."

JMI's curriculum, which won a SPNovation Award earlier this year from the State Policy Network, unpacks this key passage from the Declaration of Independence, explaining the animating ideas behind our nation's founding in a way that Florida students can appreciate.

"We wanted Florida students to be able to see the relevance of our nation's founding principles to life today," said Bill Mattox, the curriculum's lead author. "So, we included photos from the Tallahassee lunch counter protests in the section about equality and included a hanging chad photo from the 2000 election recount in the section about voting rights."

In addition to providing this special newsprint curriculum, The James Madison Institute is also helping Florida teachers obtain video footage of the Constitution Day Celebration it sponsored earlier this month with the Florida Historic Capitol Museum. This celebration featured several historic re-enactors depicting James and Dolley Madison, Ben Franklin, Patrick Henry and others.

Video footage from this event should offer Florida teachers some excellent "discussion starters" when they study Patrick Henry's famous speech or consider James Madison's role at the Constitutional Convention, Mattox said.

According to Sandy Pelham of the Florida Department of Education, the Constitution Day video packages will be available to Florida teachers via [www.floridaknowledgenetwork.org](http://www.floridaknowledgenetwork.org).

Pelham said, "By producing a video of these events and by sharing that video statewide, we can expand the opportunity given to a few hundred area students to reach a few hundred thousand, or more."
