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An alternative view of the governor's agenda

After reading Bill Cotterell's assessment of Gov. Rick Scott's accomplishments during the recent legislative session ("Scott leaves his mark on his second session," March 12), a more thorough assessment is in order. Where Cotterell asks how successful the governor has been at achieving his agenda, the more relevant question is what have the governor and the Republican majority done for the people of Florida?

A quick review of the major initiatives by the long-standing Republican majority shows us an abject failure to deliver meaningful legislation to middle-class Floridians and a penchant for dismissing data-driven policies in favor of faith-based decisions — and not the kind of faith based on a belief in God, but rather faith in the idolatry of anti-tax ideology.

In a state that ranks dead last for high-school graduation rates and dead last on K-12 spending per capita according to the Bob Graham Center, what was the big solution this Legislature came up with to improve education in Florida? — More teachers? Better curricula? Models taken from high-performing states? No, the best solution they could come up with was the failed parent trigger bill.

That's right — facing wholesale underfunding of education, the best the Republican leadership could offer parents was to sell their kids out to charter school company Parent Revolution. While there are 49 other states that have better outcomes from their public schools, the Republicans chose to try to make Florida students part of an experiment in school privatization. Facing a \$2 billion deficit, the governor and the legislative leadership proposed a massive prison privatization effort that would have turned our prisons over to prison profiteers in return for 7 percent savings — less than \$20 million annually. Was this decision based on proven reductions in recidivism rates? Better education or job training of prisoners? More effective prison management?

No, this was a "faith" based decision that it is better to save a nickel on prisons than to close a tax loophole on a tobacco company. Dosal, a Miami-based tobacco company is currently exempt from paying the same taxes and fees as other tobacco companies because they were not part of the 1997 Florida Tobacco Settlement Agreement.

According to the Consumer Federation of the Southeast, Dosal currently manufactures 20 percent of the cigarettes sold in Florida and closing the tax loophole could add between \$50 million to \$200 million a year to the tax base — many times the possible savings from the failed prison privatization effort. This would be a win for taxpayers and for public health but the option was off the table because our Republican leadership is ideologically committed to policies that put corporate tax breaks above students, prisoners and the public good.

In a final act of quixotic zeal, the "no-data" decision makers proposed a \$300 million cut to spending on higher education. While more than \$350 million a year is given to accounting and financial services through a tax loophole, lawmakers refused to close the loophole and instead chose to increase tuition for university students.

We know that spending on higher education returns \$4 to the economy for \$1 invested. What is the return on the \$350 million invested in the financial services tax loophole? I want to see the data. Where is the data to support this and the many other tax subsidies?

Florida currently spends over \$4 billion a year in corporate subsidies at the same time that it is cutting Medicare, education and a host of social services. If these subsidies are paying big economic dividends, show me the data. Instead of evidence, all they offer is the tired mantra, "taxes are bad."

In the midst of economic turmoil, with complete control of state government, the best Florida Republicans could deliver was a series of failed initiatives. With the Florida Supreme Court's rejection of the Senate's redistricting map, the most recent legislative session is best summarized as nothing but a dismal failure.

Instead of funding education or health care, addressing robo-signing and the foreclosure crisis, promoting energy efficiency and renewable energy, or supporting infrastructure projects that will benefit the public and the business community alike, this administration has distracted us with drug testing state workers who are not on drugs, and asking students to pray in underfunded schools.

Floridians deserve better. With over a decade of one-party rule, the Republican Party has had ample opportunity to improve Florida. Do you think they deserve more time?
